



Uptown Vocal Jazz Quartet - Sunday, January 12th at 7:30 pm at Turtle Point Clubhouse - Tickets Available Now


ART FILM #1 These Amazing Shadows - Friday, January 24th at 3:00 pm at the Sandcastle

Happy New Year



In 2014, Town Council is scheduling another strategic planning retreat to establish additional initiatives for the coming year. On the horizon are strategic initiatives such as continued long range financial planning, public safety deployment, additional annexation and more.

Resolution 2013-04 – Resolution for the Adoption of the 5-Year Revised Charleston Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan. The resolution reaffirms the Town's participation in the Charleston County Hazard Mitigation Plan. The Town is required to readopt the county-wide plan prior to completing its five year CSR review. After a motion and second the resolution was adopted unanimously.

2nd Reading of Ordinance 2013-12; An Ordinance To Change the Corporate Limits of the Town of Kiawah Island (Freshfields) Mayor Lipuma read Ordinance 2013-12 into the record, and after a motion and second the ordinance was adopted unanimously.

2nd Reading of Ordinance 2013-15: An Ordinance to Amend the Town of Kiawah Island Comprehensive Plan. Mayor Lipuma read Ordinance 2013-15 into the record and after a motion and second the ordinance was adopted unanimously.

2nd Reading of Ordinance 2013-14: An Ordinance to Amend Article 12 of the Town of Kiawah Island Municipal Code so that the Land Use Regulations Are Consistent with the Amended and Restated Development Agreement. Mayor Lipuma read Ordinance 2013-14 into the record and after a motion and second the ordinance was adopted unanimously.

2nd Reading of Ordinance 2013-16: An Ordinance to Enter Into an Amended and Restated Development Agreement by and Between Kiawah Resort Associates, L.P. and the Town of Kiawah Island. Mayor Lipuma stated that an updated errata sheet dated December 2, 2013 was available for review. Mr. Rhoad clarified that the motion was for the approval of the ordinance and the errata sheet. After discussion on the clarifications outlined in the errata sheet by Mr. Patch, the motion passed unanimously.

Building Review Board Appointments
The Town's Building Inspection ordinance requires the development of a Construction Board of Appeal (CBA). The CBA would be responsible for resolving any issues between the Building official, inspector or contractor. Mr. Patch nominated retired builder, Tom Walkley and retired architect, Brooks Fullerton to the appeal board. After a motion and second, the nominations were approved unanimously.

2014 Meeting and Holiday Schedules
After motion and second, Council unanimously approved the 2014 Meeting Schedule and 2014 Holiday Closing Schedule.

Tidal Trails Franchise Agreement Amendment
During the Ways & Means meeting on November 26th, Council requested additional information on the Tidal Trails Franchise. Mrs. Rucker stated that Tidal Trails has a contract with the Community Association and the Sandcastle to provide kayaks for their guests. Their service area is in

front of the Sandcastle but overlaps with that of Island Beach Services. Tidal Trails has no objection to paying a franchise fee but requests that they have the same opportunity to sell additional beach items as the other providers on the beach. Mrs. Rucker recommended that due to the limited commercial activity and potential conflict/impact to an existing Town franchise agreement, the Tidal Trails non-exclusive franchise agreement be extended for an additional two-year term without a franchise fee at this time. After extensive discussion, Council voted to table this item until further information is received.

Comprehensive Disaster Planning Update
Mr. Murphy stated that members have spent the better part of twenty-four hours in meetings to gather the information into a workable document and he felt that good progress was made. Mrs. Rucker stated that meetings have included herself, Dick Murphy, Scott Cave, Rusty Lameo, Bruce Spicher, and Russ Crane. She stated the initial phases of the project have been completed as indicated in the report including financial resources needed to complete required activities. Council will be provided with periodic updates as the various phases of the project are completed. Mrs. Rucker stated that the goal is to have the project completed around March of 2014 followed by training for Council and staff.

Committee Reports:
Mr. Murphy reported that the Public Safety Committee meeting scheduled for Wednesday, December 11th featured emphasis on the fire at 23 Rhett's Bluff. He noted that there had been a lot of dialogue on the fire within the community including news articles and a presentation by Chief Walz. Mr. Murphy stated that when he started as chair of the Public Safety committee, one of his primary goals was to make sure that there was transparency in reviewing incidents. The coverage of the fire was an example of transparency. However, some of the information needed clarification or correction. The committee discussed these items in an attempt to streamline the review process and develop a template that can be used to review future incidents. Mr. Murphy stated there was active participation within the community; Public Safety Committee and Fire District as well.

Mr. Labriola stated that at the last Environmental Committee Meeting both the Community and the Town reported on the Tallow Tree project which was very successful with approximately \$40,000 spent. He stated that the Ways and Means Committee reported that the Town is tracking well on the 2013/2014 fiscal year budget.

Mrs. Johnson stated that the Arts Council's special event of the Madrigal Feast was hosted on Sunday, December 8th at the River Course. She stated that The Messiah was presented by the Charleston Symphony Orchestra on December 19th at the Holy Spirit Catholic

Church. The next event in 2014 will be The American Chamber Players on January 5th and then it will be time for some Chamber Music and Jazz. She stated that during the month of January there will be two films, noting that the film events have been proven to be very popular in the past. The films are on Friday afternoon at 3:00pm at the Sandcastle.

Mrs. Johnson stated that the Communications Committee has played an important part in annexation as well and congratulated them for their role. She stated that in the next year the Committee will be working on new projects to continue to update and improve communication on the Island. She stated that comments and feedback are always welcome.

Mr. Patch stated that the Board of Zoning Appeals met on Monday, December 16th with three items that were reviewed by the committee.

Town Administrator's Report:
Mrs. Rucker stated that Ms. Sharon Johnson has joined the Town staff as a receptionist and building permitting clerk. The Town met with Mr. Bill Eiser of DHEC/OCRM, the Community Association and the ARB to address dune walkover construction and resolved several issues. Staff is working on a number of Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests and year end closeout procedures. She commended the Town Clerk for her hard work managing a number of requests. Mrs. Rucker stated that she has been invited to write an article for the April 2014 "Public Management" magazine, an ICMA Publication.

Mayors Report:
Mayor Lipuma thanked the Communications Committee for their assistance in communicating information during the annexation process. He stated that Mrs. Johnson and the committee did a wonderful job. He offered a special thank you to the Town Clerk, Petra Reynolds for her hard work and patience during the annexation process. On November 16th the Kiawah Island Motoring Retreat was held at the River Course with wonderful vehicles on display and a sizeable crowd in attendance. He presented the Mayor's Award which went to a 1953 Bentley Sedan that was a gorgeous car. On November 29th, Kiawah Partners hosted an oyster roast in the new park at Ocean Park. He stated that the park was magnificent, including acres of lawn, tasteful landscaping, and strategic placement of trees and water features. On the evening of the 29th, Kiawah Island Golf Resort hosted its Christmas tree lighting at the Sanctuary Hotel. He stated that he and Mr. Roger Warren gave brief opening comments.

The Town of Kiawah Island has begun its annual Business License renewal process for 2014. Business License renewal applications are due on or before February 29th to avoid late penalties. After this date, a 5% penalty per month will be applied. Any property owner and or company that conducts business within the municipality is required to obtain a yearly business license. Individuals that participate in the rental program or contract with an agency must also purchase a separate license reporting the rent they collect individually. Any individual renting either by themselves or through an agency is subject to late fees and violations set forth in the Town's Business License Ordinance, Section 4-320. In addition, individuals and agencies renting their property must pay State, County and Local Accommodations Tax. Failure to meet these obligations could bring about additional penalties and interest. Participants in the rental program are also required yearly to update their information on the Short Term Rental Form and submit this form to the Enforcement Office at Town Hall. Trees should be stripped of all decorations and placed at the curbside. Holiday: Martin Luther King Jr. - No Change in Service.
February	Holiday: President's Day / No Change in Service
March	No Change in Service. Brown Trash & Hazardous Waste: Friday March 7th.
April	Holiday: Good Friday - No Change in Service. Paper Shredding and Electronic Waste Collection – (Date to be announced)
May	Holiday: Memorial Day - No Change in Service. - Twice per week trash collection (Friday) will begins the week of May 2nd. - Change of Service Request, accepted from May 1st to May 31st. (Effective July 1st).
